<u>This Is Planet Ed</u>, an initiative of the Aspen Institute, aims to unlock the power of education as a force for climate action and solutions. We believe young people will drive the necessary and sustained action we need to address climate change, and we must partner with them to advance a more sustainable, resilient, and equitable society.

Our systems that support young people—early childhood, children's media, K-12 education, and higher education—can engage, prepare, and empower young people to succeed in a changing climate. This Is Planet Ed seeks to mobilize collaborative action across these systems to secure a livable and hopeful future for the next generation.

From school closures due to heat, to worsening asthma because of wildfire smoke, to uncertainty about their future, to coping with the loss of loved ones, our changing climate is not a distant concept but a present reality for young people across the country. Many young people are worried.

But the 74 million youth under 18 and nearly 19 million students enrolled in higher education institutions—together, about 25% of the total US population—can drive tremendous change. The education sector has a responsibility to enable young people to thrive in a changing climate and empower them for success.

Mobilizing educational leaders in the fight against climate change can help us reduce carbon pollution now and build lasting change for a sustainable, resilient, and equitable future.

OUR STRATEGY

This Is Planet Ed provides a backbone, framework, and narrative for broader collective action across education. We:

- Focus the sector around key goals and roadmaps for action.
- Foster advocates and champions for climate action across early childhood, children's media, K-12 schools, and higher education.
- Catalyze action, track progress, share best practices, and build the narrative for action through media and communications.

Planet Media Call for Pitches: The Call for Pitches requested pitches for short-form content designed to support children ages 8-12 in understanding four Essential Climate Principles.

We received hundreds of pitches from across the country, all of which incorporated the key principles through a variety of creative approaches, including animation, live action, music, and more.






Planet Media Pitch Fest



On August 1st, the Higher Ed **Climate Action Task Force** released the Higher Ed **Climate Action Plan**, which identifies the pivotal opportunity for higher education to lead climate solutions, adapt to our changing climate, and prepare students for success in a sustainable. resilient, and just society.

Specifically, the action plan describes the needs to:

EDUCATE AND SUPPORT STUDENTS:

The higher education sector can ensure that all students have a foundational level of climate literacy, an opportunity for deeper learning about climate across disciplines and through workforce development, and access to services and support in the face of climate disruptions.

ENGAGE AND SUPPORT COMMUNITIES:

Institutions can leverage community connections—engaging students, families, and community members in their language and space—to support broader action on climate change.

MODEL, RESEARCH, & DEVELOP SOLUTIONS:

The higher education sector can model, research, and develop climate mitigation and adaptation solutions that reduce carbon pollution, build resilience to potential risks, and foster innovation.

ADVANCE EQUITY:

Higher education can ensure equal opportunity for all students, institutions, and communities to benefit from a more sustainable, resilient, and equitable society





Higher Ed Climate Action Task Force and partners celebrated the <u>launch of the Higher Ed Climate Action Plan</u> at the University of Maryland, College Park and at the Reservoir Center in Washington, DC.

Task Force members were joined by key local and national stakeholders working at the intersection of climate and higher education. The roundtables provided an opportunity to elevate the role of higher education in advancing climate solutions and how the higher education sector can further help build knowledge, foster innovation, enhance communities, and model climate solutions.
